| Troop/Crew Hospitality Coordinator: Ensures Court of Honors and special ceremonies are coordinated, rooms reserved, and programs made. Secures any food needed for the ceremonies. Coordinates with Quartermaster to ensure supplies are in Scout room when needed for ceremonies. Works with SPL and scouts on COH. |
| Troop/Crew Service Project Coordinator: Ensures service projects are coordinated and available for Scouts to participate in for advancement. Works with Crew Service Coord, PLC and Committee and presents annual plan for approval. |
| Troop/Crew Equipment Coordinator: Works with youth Quartermaster and is responsible for budget, storage, maintaining & reporting inventory records and maintenance of Troop equipment. Checks out equipment for troop, patrol and crew activities. |
| Other Committee Positions: Uniform Exchange, Transportation, Webelos and Communications Coordinator, Webmaster, Eagle Scout Mentor and Chaplain. |

| Assistant Scoutmasters will assist the Scoutmaster in leading the Scouts, providing skill instruction, provides consistent adult assistance with delivering the troop program, provides two-deep leadership at troop events (camping, hiking, weekly meetings), and be assigned to one or more patrols. Duties may overlap or assist with roles in the Committee. Below are the different duties assigned to our Assistant Scoutmasters. ASMs will be appointed by the SM after a year on the Committee. Please indicate areas of interest. |
| New-Scout Patrol: Works with the Troop Guide and new-Scout patrol leader to help lead new Scouts in the Troop. |
| Cub Scout Outreach: Works with Den Chief(s) to maintain a relationship with the Cub Scout Packs in the area and help with Webelos to Boy Scout transition. Works with Webelos Coordinator. |
| Service: Helps lead the Troop/Crew's service activities. |
| Program ASM: Acting SM when necessary, implements the program and works with Camping Coordinator to make sure trip elements are implemented correctly. |
